ONE STUDENT DESCRIBES HOW DISTANCE LEARNING OPENED DOORS AT WORK

With only the math test left to get his GED® credential, Yearrell Clinkscale is rounding that last stretch of a very important journey in his life. While he has been through many ups and downs to get to this point, he is firm that he wouldn't change a thing to hold his high school diploma in his hand.

Clinkscale decided at a young age that his story wasn't over. Statistics might have suggested a very different ending for this kid from Detroit who was homeless at 15. But he realized he had options. Doing whatever it took to survive, all he knew was hard work. From his first \$5 per hour job at McDonald's to landing a position at PepsiCo Frito-Lay without any degrees, he has relied on his work ethic to see him through.

Clinkscale realized that he wanted something different in his future.

"I felt like I was missing my high school diploma," he said.

He came across the ProLiteracy New Readers Press Distance Learning program: a flexible solution to upskill today's workforce. Clinkscale credits much of his growth in the past few years to everything New Readers Press put in his life.

Our programs like GED® and HiSET® Test Preparation help students not only get their education but understand the value of having a skillset. Through the program, Clinkscale soon learned that he had a gift for speaking and teaching others. His tutors helped him articulate his skillset. Now, as the Regional Expert Trainer, he is in management traveling to different PepsiCo Frito-Lay sites in North America to help teams build a hiring and onboarding framework.

The ProLiteracy New Readers Press Distance Learning program supports employers with the right educational resources and options to meet employees where they are so they can gain the skills that break cycles of low literacy and poverty and open the door to greater opportunities.

"Education has been more than just books, numbers, As and Bs, or any grades," Yearrell said. "The program and the people have changed my life."

Empowering Teachers

TEACHER TRAINING PLUS CONTINUES TO GROW IN YEAR 3

When Judi Walsh, a tutor trained in English Language Learning (ELL), was unexpectedly asked to teach High School Equivalency (HSE), she knew she did not have the right training for it. But everything changed when she discovered ProLiteracy's Teacher Training Plus program. Judy benefited from a supportive network, practical guidance, and the confidence to succeed in both ELL and HSE instruction.

Teacher Training Plus was created to address real-world instructional issues through a comprehensive professional development framework. Designed with input from administrators and active educators, the program delivers targeted content and best-practice strategies that teachers can immediately apply in the classroom.

Now in its third year, Teacher Training Plus continues to grow, with increasing engagement and participation. Funded by our partner the Dollar General Literacy Foundation, this comprehensive professional development series addresses four key instructional areas:

- English Language Learning (ELL)
- Adult Foundational Education
- High School Equivalency (HSE)
- Workplace Literacy (WPL)

This year, Teacher Training Plus reached more than 1,000 educators, leveraging multiple touchpoints beyond traditional webinars. Each of the 12 sessions was paired with three interactive workshops, where presenters created a dynamic space for coaching, mentoring, and collaboration and shared practical strategies and classroom examples. Educators were able to exchange ideas, ask targeted questions, and dive into lesson planning, materials, and tailoring instruction to diverse learning environments.

Beyond ongoing professional learning and coaching, Teacher Training Plus awards \$60,000 worth of scholarships to participants to purchase New Readers Press materials to help meet instructional needs, as well as get a free one-year ProLiteracy membership.

Mobile Learning Fund

- Number of Programs Awarded: 96
- Number of Students Served: 3,209
- Total Amount Awarded: \$259K

Digital tools help accelerate learning by providing personalized instruction that enables learning anytime, anywhere. Through the Mobile Learning Fund, programs were able to provide access to flexible, technology-based education tools such as New Readers Press Online Learning, Learning Upgrade, and EnGen, and more.

In Charlotte, North Carolina, adult education program Fill My Cup applied to the Mobile Learning Fund when funding became a challenge last year. The program received digital licenses for Learning Upgrade, New Readers Press Online Learning, News for You Online, and EnGen.

One gentleman in his 70s came to Fill My Cup after losing his wife. His goal was to read a book, and with Learning Upgrade, Founder and Executive Director Sheila Laury said he built both his literacy and digital skills.

“Having access to research-based products and curriculum to use with our students and for our tutors and teachers ... that’s the great thing about the [Mobile Learning Fund] for us,” said Laury.

Literacy Opportunity Fund

- Number of Programs Awarded: 135
- Number of Students Served: 39,293
- Total Amount Awarded: \$637K

The Literacy Opportunity Fund, generously funded by the Nora Roberts Foundation, is one of the few grants that can go to general operating expenses. For organizations like Brush Country Literacy Council, this is crucial to ensure students get the guidance and resources needed to achieve their education goals.

With the Literacy Opportunity Fund, the Council addressed the following key areas:

- Teacher salaries to support instruction across four locations
- Instructional resources for every student
- New computers
- Access to student readiness exams

“The Literacy Opportunity Fund grant has been transformative for our program,” said Brush Country Literacy Council administrators.

PROLITERACY LAUNCHES PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT INSTITUTE TO BUILD STRONGER LEADERS

“This Professional Development Institute (PDI) experience is helping me find my voice as a program leader,” shared Alison Witmer, ELL program coordinator at Clifton Park-Halfmoon Public Library. A participant in the inaugural cohort of the PDI, she benefited from this immersive training experience. Available to members only, this course was designed for literacy program administrators seeking to strengthen their instructional leadership.

From January to March, the first cohort of participants explored key topics such as:

- understanding adult learners
- creating inclusive environments
- developing effective curriculum
- measuring success
- leading teams effectively
- leveraging data
- building professional networks

During the PDI, participants engaged in three learning cycles where they participated in pre-learning reading, a webinar, coaching, online forums, and peer support. Participants left each learning cycle with implementation plans to put into practice within their program.

Witmer realized early on in her role that some level of professional affiliation would benefit her as well as her volunteer tutors. Post COVID, the library was looking to refresh the ELL program with more dedicated resources. Witmer realized that ProLiteracy had a comprehensive approach to support administrators, educators, and learners. The true difference is the personalized attention she felt from the instructors.

This relationship has enabled programs like Wallace State Adult Education to adopt innovative solutions to reinvigorate learning.


Wallace State ESL tutor Vikki Leggett has seen first-hand how students can excel when given access to quality learning tools. The ESL program started using EnGen over two years ago, and students at every level immediately became

The platform also offers opportunities for 1:1 virtual instruction and live workshops throughout the day and evening with English social hours and extra career readiness advice.

workshops, he used the program any time he could, until one night he couldn't.

He messaged Leggett at 9 o'clock at night when he couldn't get into a workshop. He told her something was wrong. After some digging, Leggett discovered that nothing was wrong; Mario had exceeded his workshop hours for the month included in the subscription.

"I never had a student do that before," Leggett said.

Using EnGen has been so successful, that Leggett developed an entire GED® test prep class with a goal to help students pass the GED test in English.

"That year when we started EnGen, I had eight people pass the GED test that started out as an English language learner," Leggett said. "I really felt like EnGen was pivotal to helping those students."

2024 Conference Review

EDUCATING THE MARKET



For four days in October, adult education tutors and teachers, program administrators and advocates, and researchers and literacy experts gathered along the Chesapeake Bay for professional learning, networking and celebration.

ProLiteracy's biennial Conference on Adult Education in Baltimore, Maryland, brought together nearly 500 attendees to participate in over 130 workshops addressing:

- asset-based instruction
- student study habits
- reading strategies for students with learning disabilities
- building writing stamina
- supporting student advocacy
- administrative strategies that improve student persistence and tutor retention

This conference featured the first ever preconference Master Class on Nonprofit Storytelling that was free to ProLiteracy members. Led by ProLiteracy staff experts, participants learned how to tailor the compelling stories of adult literacy for advocacy, marketing, and fundraising.

TV host, author, and changemaker Van Jones delivered a powerful keynote speech highlighting the exponential impact teaching someone to read has on adults and the community around them. He identified reading as the foundational skill that civilized the Western world—as different groups of people with different experiences learn to read, they lift different interpretations and transform society. He ended by emphasizing that we'll never know the extent to which we've impacted the future. "Things that seem impossible to solve might be possible because of you."

We also honored an amazing group of adult learners, tutors, and programs during the highly anticipated awards ceremony.

Last year, we lost a giant. Our co-founder, Ruth Johnson Colvin, a fearless trailblazer for adult literacy, passed away at the age of 107. And though she's no longer with us in body, her spirit burns on in every classroom, every tutoring session, and every person who refuses to leave someone behind.

Ruth didn't just build a literacy movement. She positioned literacy as a civil right for all adults because she understood something many still miss: literacy is freedom—the freedom to work and earn a sustaining wage. The freedom to vote. The freedom to raise your children with confidence. She knew that when you help someone learn to read or write, you're revealing new opportunities and strengthening their belief that they can achieve more. So, she took action.

In 1961, Ruth read a report that 11,000 adults in her own city couldn't read. She didn't wait for permission or funding or fanfare. With humility and unstoppable drive, she created tools, trained volunteers, and met learners where they were. That spark became Literacy Volunteers of America. That eternal spark became ProLiteracy Worldwide in 2002.

Ruth made it clear: literacy is not charity. It is justice.

Her work empowered adults to pass the citizenship test. To read job applications, prescriptions, and voting ballots. To teach their children. To claim their voice. She didn't see race, gender, income, or age as barriers. She believed that no one should be written off because of where they came from or what they didn't yet know.

And she never stopped. Not at 60. Not at 80. Not at 100. She traveled the globe to train tutors. She answered emails from learners. She wrote books. She listened. She gave. She never lost sight of the mission: a world where literacy is a right, not a privilege. She received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in recognition of her life's work. But she didn't do it for medals. She did it because she believed in people—in the boundless potential of every human being.

That belief lives in us now.

Let us say, with our work, that we will not stop until every person, everywhere, has the power to read, to write, and to rise.
